<b>PERIOD POVERTY UPDATE – FEMININE HYGIENE PRODUCTS IN SCHOOLS</b>

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**1. PURPOSE OF THE REPORT**

The purpose of this report is to provide Members with an update on the Council's progress of tackling period poverty within schools across Rhondda Cynon Taf following the previous update on 20 March 2019 and to look at the way forward.

**2. RECOMMENDATIONS**

It is recommended that Members:

- 2.1 Scrutinise and comment on the information contained within this report.
- 2.2 Consider whether the Committee supports Cabinet exploration to fund the continuation of the scheme if Welsh Government funding ceases in March 2020.

**3. BACKGROUND TO THE REPORT**

- 3.1 A notice of motion was brought to the Council in July 2017 seeking that the Council will research the availability of free sanitary products, such as tampons and towels, in all Secondary Schools in the County as an acknowledgement that they are as essential as toilet paper for the personal hygiene of female pupils.
- 3.2 Following agreement for this work, the Children and Young People Scrutiny Committee established a Scrutiny Working Group to investigate the current approach to the provision and disposal of sanitary products in primary and secondary schools. The Working Group put forward 15 recommendations which received cross-party support when considered by Full Council.
- 3.3 Cabinet subsequently considered an implementation plan aimed at improving the availability of free sanitary products for female learners in schools, which would make Rhondda Cynon Taf the first Council in Wales to introduce this measure.
- 3.4 Full Council supported the move in February 2018, which required all schools in RCT with pupils aged nine and above, to provide free sanitary products for female learners to access independently. Cabinet gave final approval at its meeting on Thursday, April 19, 2018 which saw a six-month trial commencing in the autumn

term 2018 to allow time for installation, before a review and subsequent full implementation in April 2019.

- 3.5 The implementation plan outlined a number of key milestones and delivery dates for the introduction of the scheme, which members were provided an update on in March 2019.
- 3.6 The final actions point of the implementation plan was 'To further review the scheme in 6 months to determine if it should continue and to seek funding to sustain it beyond the Welsh Government grants.'

#### **4. PROGRESS SINCE THE LAST REVIEW**

- 4.1 One concern raised by members previously was the lack of responses to the survey undertaken with schools and pupils. The previous surveys had 79 pupil responses ranging from year 7 to 13 across nine secondary schools and 105 school responses.
- 4.2 A follow up survey was therefore undertaken with schools and pupils with results indicated below.

#### **4.3 Pupil Views**

4.3.1 To date, 433 pupils' responses have been received.

4.3.2 Respondents ranged from Year 6 to Year 13 with the majority attending Y Pant Comprehensive School. Pupils from 16 schools responded in total (two through schools, seven primary schools and seven secondary schools.) In the previous survey we did not have any views from primary aged children.

4.3.3 89% of respondents said they were aware that free sanitary products were available at their school. A 13% increase on the previous survey.

4.3.4 94% of respondents said they believed it was a good idea that free sanitary products were available at their school. Only 1% said it was not a good idea with the remaining 5% saying they did not know if it was a good idea or not. Of those who said 'yes' comments included 'in case of an emergency,' 'some families may not be able to afford sanitary products. They may also feel uncomfortable to tell a teacher' and 'It's natural and you shouldn't have to spend money for them.' Of those who said 'no' the main theme of comments given was due to misuse.

4.3.5 84% knew where the sanitary products were located in the school. An 8% increase on the previous survey. The places included girls' toilets (36%); medical room (36%); Reception area (14%); via designated member of staff (7%); and in offices/central points (6%).

4.3.6 16% of respondents stated they had used the products available, 66% stated they have not but would consider using them if they needed and 18% stated they have not and would not consider using the products. The main reason given for those who have not used the products but would consider in future is that they have not yet started their periods. For those who stated they would not use in future, reasons included not wanting to ask staff or access in public places due to embarrassment; always having their own products with them and a small number stated concern over others tampering with the products.

4.3.7 To the question of awareness of stickers on cubicle doors where products were kept, 58% responded saying they were aware of these stickers, 29% said they had not seen them with 13% stating they had not looked. This is a 17% increase on the number of respondents who stated they had seen stickers on the doors and the majority of the responses stating they had not seen them were linked to those in 4.3.5 who stated products were not kept in toilet cubicles.

4.3.8 Of those who stated that products were kept in toilets, 55% stated that disposal bins were present in the same cubicle with 26% saying they were not and the remaining 19% saying they had not checked. This is a decrease on the previous survey where 69% stated they were present in the same cubicle.

4.3.9 When asked if the dispensers were always filled, 27% stated they were (down 1%), 25% stated they were not (down 14%) and the remainder 48% said that they did not know (up 15%). From analysis of these figures, the majority who stated they did not know were from the primary phase which was not included in the previous survey.

4.3.10 When asked how did they find out about the free sanitary products, respondents were able to click more than one option. 35% stated they had heard via a school assembly, 29% via posters/leaflets, 16% via friends, 12% told in lessons or by school staff, and 7% had seen the products/door stickers for themselves. 2% chose 'Other' and comments included finding out via a YEPS Worker, School Nurse, parent asking the school and 'thought they were just in all schools.'

#### **4.4 School Views**

4.4.1 To date, 56 school responses have been received. The breakdown of schools is as follows: 38 primary schools, 10 secondary schools, 3 through schools, 4 special schools and 1 PRU.

4.4.2 91% of respondents indicated that the dispenser had been fitted at their school. Increase of 5% since the last survey.

4.4.3 Of those fitted, 67% have been fitted in the girls toilet cubicle; 12% in disabled toilets; 8% in mixed use toilet cubicles; 6% in the hand basin area and the remaining 8% in 'other'. The other responses included adult female toilets and schools who had fitted dispensers in more than one location that included girls' toilets, mixed toilets, disabled toilets and visitor toilets.

4.4.4 When asked if an identification sticker has been placed on the door, 72% stated it had (increase of 22%), 24% saying it had not (decrease of 14%) and 4% stating they did not know (decrease of 8%). Reasons given for not placing the stickers included availability in central areas so not needed; pupil voice within the school suggested girls did not want to draw attention to the cubicle in mixed use areas; pupils informed via other means including talks and posters; and some not aware that stickers accompanied the dispensers.

4.4.5 This year the grant funding from Welsh Government was allocated directly to schools. 98% of responses said this was a positive move. The only negative response commented that 'schools now have another job to do'.

4.4.6 88% had briefed their pupils on the reason for the dispensing unit and what they can expect from the scheme. Increase of 20% following the last survey.

4.4.7 Schools were asked for their opinion as to whether there had been a positive reaction for the units and products. 63% stated 'yes' (increase of 4%), 13% stated 'no' (decrease of 2%), and 25% (decrease of 2%) stated that they did not know as they had not gathered feedback. Additional comment to this questions was mixed with some schools stating pupils appreciated the free availability and feel comfortable with the system whilst other schools stated misuse had led to centralised holding of products and some primary schools stating they had not seen any demand from pupils.

4.4.8 64% of schools stated that it was too difficult to tell if the scheme had helped to improve attendance.

4.4.9 76% stated the scheme had not been abused since its implementation (decrease of 2%), with 18% it had (increase of 3%) and 6% stating they did not know (decrease of 1%). The comments highlighted that most abuse was isolated incidents and mainly involved younger boys in primary schools.

4.4.10 To date, 11% of schools stated they had sought feedback about the scheme from their pupils, with 57% of schools saying they would look to do this in the near future.

4.4.11 Schools were asked if they had considered offering reusable products. 5% stated they already have these available with a further 27% indicating they wish for more information in order to implement. 67% indicated they had not considered this.

4.4.12 Overall the comments about the scheme were extremely positive from schools with one stating 'the fact our girls no longer have to worry is invaluable' and another stating 'the scheme has been a success and it is particularly good as our school is in an area of deprivation. An excellent scheme.'

## **5. MANAGEMENT AND MONITORING OF THE SCHEME**

- 5.1 In the inception stage, the Attendance and Wellbeing Service managed the scheme, including purchasing of the dispensing units using the Welsh Government grant; placing regular orders for the sanitary products; arranging delivery of the products via the service's officers; facilitating the surveys with pupils and school staff and having regular update reports from the School Facilities Services Supervisors. Whilst this was effective to drive the initial stages of the scheme, it did not allow for a timely response to the scheme due to other priorities that also need to be managed.
- 5.2 In March 2019, RCTCBC received confirmation of grant funding from Welsh Government to the sum of £185,977. This was a significant increase in the previous year's funding of £17,700. The grant criteria included spend on products only to all learners with 10% of the total amount spent purchasing reusable products.
- 5.3 Therefore in a meeting with several key partners in April 2019, it was decided that the Head of Attendance and Wellbeing would continue to operate an oversight of the scheme with School Facilities Services Supervisors continuing to operate monitoring reports on the implementation of the scheme within schools. Appendix One contains the latest audit information from School Facilities Services. However, in a change of

direction and due to the large grant funding made available, funding would be allocated directly to schools to be able to purchase their own products as and when needed to meet the demands of their individual settings. As outlined in 4.4.5, schools have welcomed this move in the majority.

- 5.4 The 10% spend outlined in 5.2 was allocated only to secondary schools in light of the need to educate many learners on their use. Schools have queried the need to purchase reusable products if young people are not using them or pupil voice has suggested they will not use them. Feedback has been sought from Welsh Government who stated on 31 May 2019 that they will be issuing guidance in the future.
- 5.5 Welsh Government also awarded a separate grant of £17,696 aimed at providing products for women and girls from low income households. This funding was allocated to Community Services.

## **6. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

- 6.1 There are currently no additional financial implications to the Council beyond the extent of the revenue provided by the Welsh Government grant.
- 6.2 However, this funding has only been committed until 31<sup>st</sup> March 2020. Therefore, from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2020, the Council may have to consider whether it wishes to fund the scheme in order to maintain it. If so, it would need to be considered whether to maintain it at its current level or at a proportion of its current scale. Feedback from schools would provide an indication of the demand and if current provision meets the needs of the users.

## **7. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS OR LEGISLATION CONSIDERED**

- 7.1 There are no legal implications aligned to this report.

## **8. LINKS TO THE COUNCILS CORPORATE PLAN/CORPORATE PRIORITIES/SIP**

- 8.1 Cwm Taf's Wellbeing Plan 2018-2023 is a statement of intent which introduces principles to guide public sector organisations in the region to work together in the future to further develop a collaborative service for "resilient communities that are informed, connected, active and resourced and have the ability to adapt to and influence change and improve well-being".
- 8.2 The Council's Corporate Plan places People as one of the three priorities ensuring a focus on 'promoting independence and positive lives for everyone.'
- 8.3 This scheme has allowed young people to express their views on period poverty and connected matters, in an effort to create a better future for themselves and the future generations of female learners throughout RCT. We have aimed to ensure products are accessed independently and available whenever needed.

## **9. CONCLUSION**

- 9.1 Based on responses from schools and the progress against the recommendations, the scheme appears to be well implemented across most schools in Rhondda Cynon Taf.
- 9.2 The vast majority of responses from schools were positive, suggesting that the operation was well-received and needed.
- 9.3 Ongoing monitoring of the scheme has been devised into the day-to-day operational tasks of Schools Facilities Services Supervisors and this will continue.
- 9.4 Feedback from schools has indicated the level of funding this year was high and due to the specification that only products could be purchased it could result in a surplus of products being stored at schools. It is believed that lower levels of future funding could still meet the needs of pupils.
- 9.5 This review has been brought to Children and Young People's Scrutiny Committee for recommendation for Cabinet's consideration of additional funding from April 2020 onwards upon the cessation of the Welsh Government grant.
